A message from Pastor Chris. . .

Someday is Today

I sit here with grey skies outside and a warm cup of coffee in hand and looking at the numerous books on my shelf. I think about how many of them I have not fully read. I won't lie, I've read some of the books and well, life comes a calling, which only allows me to get a few chapters into the book. I have never been dedicated to reading, but my collection of books says differently. However, on this particular day I have found myself flipping through books, wanting to dive into them and fulfill the promise I made when acquiring them, "I will get to it someday." I am eager to do some of this reading for fun, not because I have to like I did in seminary, or for preparation of a sermon or something else.

A while back one of the confirmation students asked me if I have read the whole Bible, which came during a conversation about the importance of scripture and reading it, and thinking about how this affects our faith. My response to the student was simply, "no." However, I have read the Bible in bits and pieces perhaps more than once, but not from cover to cover, from Genesis to Revelation. I have several Bibles that outline to do so in a year, and they take their place the bookshelf. We have had confirmation students try a ninety-day read, and students that have committed to reading a chapter a day.

It makes me want to turn over a new leaf, to start something new, to do some of that reading that I have put off for a few years. Perhaps for the next 11 months, I could make a commitment to do some of this reading and join with the students in their dedication to going through the Bible.

Many of us make these commitments or resolutions, but research has shown that 66% give up by the end of January. So, it seems like the beginning of February would be a good time to start something. Turning the page of our lives, uncovering areas in our lives that we lack, indulge, or even idolatry. I will not prescribe anything for your life; however, I do invite you to join me in reading of the Bible in the course of the year or a ninety-day.

The ELCA continues to emphasize the reading and grounding our lives on the Word of God, the scriptures, the Bible. During our discussion about reading the Bible, a confirmation student asked if they read the Bible once if they need to read it again, to which my reply was simply "yes." I told them that we could read passages and think about different things no matter how much we read. Because through our life experiences scripture opens up new to us, we read things differently, interpret differently.

It is a spiritual practice to read the Bible, to read about the prophets, the Kings, the stories of healing, the Psalms of lament, the writings of Paul; and about the birth the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is something that we can do now, next week, next year, and forever as we continue to have live in faith. Whether we reach the goals we set out to meet, or whether we fail, we live in a reality that we are loved by a merciful God, purely just because.

If you would like an outline for reading scripture daily, please let me know!

Lent begins on Feb. 14; the word *Lent* comes from the Anglo Saxon word that means “spring” or “springtime”. Taken literally, the word means that this is the time of the year when the days lengthen. This season of the church year is a time of preparation, reflection, growth, and change. As God’s people take time to learn more about God and their relationship to God and to others, the season before Easter can be seen as the springtime of the soul—a time of growth in faith and a time to nurture the faith that is already theirs. Purple is the color associated with Lent and is used in churches that observe liturgical traditions. Purple is a solemn color, reminiscent of royalty and repentance. It reflects the serious and somber nature of this time in the life of the church. (Before and After Easter –Aug./Fortress)

“For God so Loved the World” So far we have met Viveca from Sweden, Ferry from Iran, Fumiko from Japan, and Pastor Bradn, who served in Russia. This month we will be meeting Mary Winsor, who is serving with ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission in Mexico City. Come see the very large world map in the youth room, next to the elevator. My favorite zoom call led to one of our youth, Harper, telling me “We match, we match” as she met Ferry’s niece who is the same age she is. They both had shoulder length dark hair, dark eyes and were wearing pink and gray. THE SALINA RESCUE MISSION

Every night, the beds of The Salina Rescue Mission are filled by someone needing safe shelter. There are 76 beds available at the Mission and they are usually full on a nightly basis.

The Salina Rescue Mission feeds more than 50,000 meals a year to struggling men, women, and families in the Saline County area. A meal is provided to anyone that is hungry.

Recovery & employment programs and financial counseling are available to all the men who need some support to get back on their own two feet.

Your help is needed to assist with these programs at the Mission. You can participate in some upcoming events; like the Stutzman's Flower Sale in April, or the Golf Tournament in May. You can volunteer to serve as a family, group, or individual. Volunteers are needed to prepare or serve the food, drive a van to run errands, help with maintenance issues, assist the men with paperwork, help with fundraising events or give a chapel message.

ARCHIVES

February 1983: Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ostlind announced their retirement as custodians of Bethany Church. They served for seventeen years.

April 1983: Mr. Carl Peterson announced the planting of several memorial trees on the church property. These trees are given in loving memory of Mr. Jack Ebling by his family and friends.

May 1983: Mr. Ralph Roberts was hired as church custodian. The Holy Communion schedule was changed to the second Sunday of each month for the 8:15 and 10:30 a.m. services. For the summer; fellowship time was changed to 9:15 a.m. and Sunday School classes will rotate serving coffee and rolls.

June 1983: Black Augustana hymnals, half size black hymnals and red service book hymnals were given away during the summer.

July 1983: A successful VBS was celebrated by many. Co-directors Norma Verndon and Linda Anderson planned around the theme "I Love to tell the story." One hundred and twenty children attended the 4-day school. Shirley Malm created coloring books, Lee's Thriftway provided the drinks, and numerous volunteers provided snacks, games and nursery care. The children performed a Bible story, using puppets and actions songs for their parents on the last day.

August 1983: A one-week Handbell Ringers clinic was conducted at Bethany Church for high school students. The clinic was conducted by Elmer and Ruth Copley.

September 1983: The following musical opportunities were presented to the congregation, in hopes of obtaining new members. The Adult Church Choir, directed by Dorothy Patrick, high school age and up. Son Rise Choir, directed by Diane Hopp, grades 4-6. Carol Choir, directed by Lori Lindshield, for grades 1-3. The Adult Handbell Choir, directed by Ruth Copley, for all adults, men and women. The Highschool Handbell Choir, directed by Ruth Copley, for grades 9-12.

October 1983: A dynamic teacher training workshop entitled "Strengthening Our Sunday School" occurred for three evenings in October and November. Demonstrations were provided by Maridene Lundstrom, Charlotte Ternstrom, Lynette Jones, Elizabeth Johnson, Judy Burch and Kay Berenson. Superintendent Patricia Roraback; presented on "Insights into Teaching," and Pastor Johnson gave the Bible Study. This event was well attended.




